Committee News

Lions Celia and Skip have been busy organizing and carrying out a wonderful new public awareness event called "Recycle for Sight." Working with Donn Tignanelli, Director of Community Relations for Rochester Community Schools, all elementary schools in Rochester, Rochester Hills and Oakland County are conducting this new program. Here is the press release which appears on Rochester Community School's website:

"RECYCLE FOR SIGHT" PLACES FOCUS ON GIVING THIS OCTOBER



During the month of October, Rochester Community Schools will be Giving the Gift of Sight to those in need by partnering with the Rochester and Rochester Hills Lions Club. The Recycle for Sight program has been in place for over sixty years, and is part of a national drive to collect used prescription eyeglasses, and

prescription and non-prescription sunglasses. The used eyeglasses collected will be recycled and hand delivered by Lions Club volunteers to people in developing countries who cannot afford eyeglasses.

Lions Club members will place collection containers at each of the District's thirteen elementary schools throughout the month of October. In addition, Lions Club members will visit some of the elementary schools to present information about the services available through the Lions Club International.

According to the World Health Organization, one-fourth of the world needs corrective eyewear, but many people, especially those in developing countries, do not have access to it. "Look for your used eyeglasses and sunglasses in every nook and cranny of your home or place of work. Ask your neighbors and relatives to donate their old eyeglasses as well," said Donn Tignanelli, Director of Community Relations for Rochester Community Schools. All types of prescription and non-prescription eyeglasses and sunglasses, and especially children's glasses are in need, as they are in high demand but in short supply. "Whether they are big or small, fashionably in or out, your glasses could change how someone in a developing country sees the world!"

Community members who do not have children in elementary schools can drop off eyeglasses at the Rochester Community Schools Administration Center, 501 W. University from October 1 to 31. A collection box is also available at the Rochester Post Office. For additional information, please contact the Rochester Community Schools Community Relations Department at 248.726.3185.
