A Brief History - The Michigan Eye-Bank was organized in Ann Arbor, Michigan in 1957 as a joint project of the Ann Arbor Host Lions Club and the University of Michigan Medical Center. In 1963, the Eye-Bank became a founding member of the Eye Bank <u>Association of America (EBAA)</u>. In 1971, the Eye-Bank was accepted as a State Project of Michigan Lions and, in 1973, the Eye-Bank was incorporated as a Michigan not-forprofit corporation with 501(c)(3) status.

A New Name: An Enduring

Mission - In 1985, the scope of the corporation's interest was expanded to include the recovery of other tissue in addition to eyes. The organization's name has changed several times over the years; it is now officially named MEBTC. This is translated as Michigan Eye-Bank and Transplantation Center in Michigan and as Midwest Eye-Banks and Transplantation Center in Illinois, Ohio and elsewhere.

The Eye-Bank's Service Area

Expands - The entire state of Michigan is served by the Michigan Eye-Bank with the incorporation, in 1971, of the Eye Bank at Wayne State University's Kresge Eye Institute and, in 1989, of the former Upper Peninsula Lions Eye Bank in Marguette. The MEBTC took over operation of the Illinois Eye-Bank (IEB) in Chicago in 1985 at the request of the Chicago Ophthalmological Society. In 1996, the Watson Gailey Eye-Bank in central Illinois affiliated with MEBTC and services were extended to Northwest Ohio that year.

A Single Purpose - The Gift of Sight - Time has passed, but our commitment to sight restoration remains the same. The Eye-Bank provides corneas for transplant,

promotes public education and supports eye and vision research. We do all of this to achieve a single purpose - to give the <u>Gift of Sight</u>.

Before someone like Carmen can receive a sight restoring corneal transplant, there must be a donor whose surviving family decides to give the gift.

At the Midwest Eye-Banks and Transplantation Center, we make the Gift of Sight possible by bringing together corneal tissue donors and the people for whom a corneal transplant is literally a second chance for sight. Our commitment to the restoration of sight continues as we strive to educate people about the ongoing need for eye donors.

Corneal Problems Cause 10% of

Blindness - A corneal transplant is performed when the normally transparent cornea is scarred or distorted due to injury, degeneration or infection. Ten percent of all blinding eye diseases are due to corneal problems, which can be reversed through a corneal transplant.

Recovering Corneal Tissue -

MEBTC's primary purpose is to recover, process, and distribute corneal tissue for transplantation. In order to provide the highest quality tissue for transplant, the eyes or

corneas must be recovered as soon as possible after the donor's death.

Testing and Evaluating Tissue for Transplantation - Eye tissue is transported to one of the Eye-Bank's laboratories, where it is evaluated by certified technicians working under the supervision of an MEBTC Medical Director. All **MEBTC Medical Directors are** fellowship trained. Board certified corneal surgeons. After the corneas are preserved, they are evaluated and a sample of the donor's blood is submitted for serologic tests. If the serology is negative and the tissue is determined suitable for surgical use, the corneas are then available for transplantation.

One Result of Continuous

Improvement - MEBTC, through its several divisions in Michigan and Illinois, distributes more than 2,000 corneas for transplant annually. Since 1991, MEBTC has distributed corneal tissue based on a Scheduled Surgery System, allowing corneal surgeons to schedule their patients for a transplant up to six months in advance of the procedure. Since the program began, the Eye-Bank has successfully met the schedule for providing tissue over 99% of the time. This allows both patients and surgeons to plan for the surgery, greatly reducing the anxiety and waiting time previously associated with a corneal transplant

Michigan Model Set for March 15th Our club has decided to hold a membership drive modeled on the Michigan Model format. The format for this event is to invite prospective members to an open house that has a program specifically set up to orientate these prospective members to the various aspects of Lionism and to educate them what it means to be a Lion.
