## American Express "Member's Project" Update

The race for the \$5 million top prize was fierce. LCIF's "Preventable Blindness for the World" project made it to the final 25 projects selected.

Additional voting narrowed the field to five project finalists. Unfortunately, our project was not selected. Here are the five finalists in order of votes garnered as of July 31, 2007:

- (1) Safe Drinking Water for Children—Votes 21,006
- (2) Teacher's Ask, You Choose, Students Learn— Votes 11,319
- (3) Wind & Solar for Residential-Votes 11,436
- (4) Restore Our National Parks—Votes 9,554
- (5) Plant a Million Trees—Votes 5,532

#### **Protect Yourself from Mortgage Fraud!**

Imagine having to prove that your home—finally or nearly paid off; the place where you lovingly raised your family—is truly your home!

Unfortunately, today..there are no limits or ends that criminals will stoop to..including defrauding you out of your home. Here's how it's done..right here in Michigan! "Perps" are using forged documents to "buy" and then mortgage homes they don't own, leaving the real homeowners with a mess that can cost thousands of dollars in attorneys fees to unravel.

Criminals are long gone by the time the fraud is uusally discovered. Some Oakland County homeowners have literally learned that their homes have been "sold" out from under them only because they receive an eviction notice from the bank. It's a devastating crime...that hurts everyone but none more than senior citizens who have saved a lifetime to purchase their home.

The FBI has named Michigan one of the top 10 hotspots for mortgage fraud, which often involved deed fraud. It's so lucrative, one newspaper has dubbed it "the new street hustle." Will it happen to you? Probably not, but education and awareness are the keys.

By law, the Oakland County Clerk/Register of Deeds Office must accept documents to be recorded if they are properly filled out. However, their office has developed, with private industry, a new online service that can help homeowners determine what documents have been recorded against their name with the Register of Deeds Office.

FRAUDCHECK, believed to be the first in the country, allows homeowners to go online to check recent activity. The service is FREE. To use FRAUDCHECK:

- 1. Go to www.oakgov.com/clerkrod
- 2. Scroll down. Click on the FRAUDCHECK
- 3. Enter your name
- 4. Records will indicate any recent activity filed against your name.
- 5. If there has been unauthorized activity, call our Tract Index Department at (248) 858-5696



## **Grandfather of Our Country**

Benjamin Franklin



"Well Done is Better Than Well Said;"
"A Man Who Lies Down With Dogs, Gets Up With Fleas;"

"A Fool is a Man Who Cannot Hide Wisdom;"
"The Squeaky Wheel Gets the Oil;"

"A Real Friend Is Your Greatest Possession;"
"When You Finish Changing, You Are Finished"

"Being Ignorant Is Not As Bad As Being Unwilling To Learn"

"Time is Money"

The above examples are but a few of the many axioms of Benjamin Franklin who many consider "The Grand-

father of Our Country." The first of the baby boomers are now entering their sixties and beginning the end game of their lives. As in every other phase of their lives, this demographic group will have a major impact on the future of the United States. How will this aging cohort contribute in a productive way to our country?

Franklin's achievements in his old age are the ones that are likely to remain the most indelibly etched in American history as more centuries go by. In an era when the average life span was somewhere in the forties Franklin lived to be 84. It wasn't an easy 84, as he was beset with maladies common to the times. However, despite these setbacks he was undaunted.

Just after his seventieth birthday Franklin was busy as a revolutionary, presiding at the first Continental Congress, editing Jefferson's work on the Declaration of Independence, and becoming its oldest signer.

To put Franklin's age in context it might be useful to compare him to some of the historical founding luminaries of the time. John Adams was then 41, Sam Adams, 54, Thomas Jefferson, 33, George Washington, 44, John Jay, 31, and John Hancock, 39.

At 70, Franklin was only beginning his contribution to the birth and defense of the fledgling nation. He spent the next nine years in Europe, tirelessly working to provide financial and material support for the battle and subsequent peace back home. In 1782, he, along with John Jay and John Adams, negotiated The Treaty of Peace with Great Britain.

In 1785 he made his last voyage home. However, he still wasn't done with his contributions. In 1787, he was elected president of the Pennsylvania Society for Promoting the Abolition of Slavery, as well serving as delegate to the Constitutional Convention.

As we all contemplate the aging process and where we fit in the scheme of things, we might stop and once again take a very hard look at the old Ben Franklin. We can't be him, nor will we necessarily duplicate his grand achievements, but we certainly can try to think as he did about the seasons of life, and learn from his approach to all aspects of our lives.
